WASH in HCFs in the SDGs

6.1 By 2030, achieve **universal** and equitable access to safe and affordable drinking water **for all**

6.2 By 2030, achieve access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene **for all** and end open defecation, paying special attention to the needs of women and girls and those in vulnerable situations

“Universal”/ “for all” includes institutions

- WASH in HCFs is crucial for infection prevention & limiting spread of disease, particularly for vulnerable populations¹
- Due to higher risk of disease transmission, WinHCFs may have even greater potential to control larger disease epidemics compared to HH settings²

SDG Monitoring of WinHCFs

How will we measure global progress toward SDGs for WinHCF?

- Harmonized indicators needed
- Global task teams working to agree on SDG indicators for WinS/HCFs

Progress:

- Draft core indicators & recommended questions are being discussed (*Based on global norms*)

Next steps: Expert meeting 22-23 June 2016 for final agreement on indicators and questions (*feedback welcome*); Publication expected in July

Proposed SDG indicators for WinHCFs

“Basic” Water - Improved water source which is **on site** and **available**

“Basic” Sanitation - Improved facilities which are **usable, separated for patients and staff, sex-separated** with **MHM facilities**, & meet needs of those with **limited mobility**

“Basic” Hand Hygiene - Hand hygiene facilities with **water and soap (or alcohol rub)** available at **points of care** and within 5m of **latrines**

“Basic” Cleaning - All toilets, floors and surfaces are cleaned, at least **once a day**, with **water and detergent**

“Basic” Waste Disposal - Bins are in place for segregating waste close to the generation point and waste is **treated and disposed of safely**

	Unimproved/None Unprotected dug well or spring, cart with small tank / drum, tanker truck, surface water; or no water	Unimproved/None Pit latrines without a slab or platform, hanging latrines and bucket latrines, or there are no toilets or latrines	Unimproved/None Hand hygiene stations without soap or water or there are no hand hygiene facilities	Unimproved/None No regular cleaning is carried out at the facility or regular cleaning but with no detergent	Unimproved/None Waste is not separated or safely treated and disposed

Potential data sources

Data sources for SDGs should build on existing systems

- WHO Service Availability and Readiness Assessment (SARA)
- World Bank Service Delivery Indicators SDI,
- USAID/DHS SPA,
- HMIS, other national assessments

Harmonisation needed for SDG monitoring; regional & global estimates –
possible for national systems?
